**Position Paper**

**Development Surveillance and Screening in the Medical Home**

February 9, 2007

1. The early identification of developmental disorders promotes the well-being of children and their families.
2. Medical home surveillance and screening are key to the early identification of developmental concerns.
3. HAAP endorses the recommendations in the AAP Policy Statement "Identifying Infants and Young Children with Developmental Disorders in the Medical Home: An Algorithm for Developmental Surveillance and Screening" (*Pediatrics* July, 2006;118 (1):405-420; errata 2006;118:1808-1809).
4. HAAP will work to enable pediatric providers to:
  - a. Perform developmental surveillance at every well-child visit.
  - b. Do developmental screening using a standardized screening tool at 9, 18, and 24 month visits or when concern is expressed.
5. HAAP will work with the Screening Task Force in developing recommendations for standardized developmental screening for Hawaii.
6. HAAP will work with MedQUEST on EPSDT requirements.
7. HAAP's recommended standardized screening tools include the Parents' Evaluation of Developmental Status (**PEDS**) and Ages and Stages Questionnaire (**ASQ**) both of which are valid, have a sensitivity and specificity of at least 70-80%, and are affordable and feasible in a small office setting.
8. There should be specific screening for Autism Spectrum Disorder at 18 months, 24 months and 36 months. HAAP recommends **M-CHAT**.
9. Developmental surveillance and standardized screening are resource intensive and therefore implementation of these services is dependant upon appropriate payment and thoughtful resource allocation.
10. Follow-up and/or early intervention services for young children with developmental concerns must be available statewide.
